Dear Parents/Guardians,
Welcome back to school

- it does not seem all that long since I last wrote for Roundabout, whilst at the same time the summer holiday seems a lifetime ago. It always amazes me how only a few weeks into term we are all back in the swing of things.

Our Governing Body has already had its first meeting of the year, and priorities for the year ahead have been set. Presently, we are excited about the upcoming parent governor elections and look forward to welcoming a new member in October. To all those involved, the very best of luck.

The landscape of education is forever changing and the coming year has the Governing Body focusing on ensuring our pupils receive the best and most varied teaching possible in line with new curriculum guidelines. On a much bigger scale the drive in education is now for schools to investigate achieving academy status, and more than ever in the form of a Multi-Academy Trust (MAT). This is a formal collaboration between two or more schools, where all of the schools in the trust are overseen
by a single board of trustees. The House of Commons Education Committee has published a number of reports
on the benefits and pitfalls of becoming a MAT and within them state their expectation that over the next 5-6 years most local authority schools will form or become part of a MAT. The belief is that being part of a MAT allows schools to share best practice, improve financial efficiency, focus funds where they are needed, and establish good succession planning programmes. Schools will benefit from working together while still retaining a level of autonomy and their own unique identity. There will be a single Board of Trustees to oversee the MAT, but each school has the opportunity to maintain a local Governing Body to represent the interests of their school. Headteachers will continue to lead their own school within the MAT, their main focus being on teaching and learning, as operational aspects of school management will be dealt with by the Trust. Reassuringly, a school within a MAT will receive the same funding as when it was a maintained school but the funding will come directly to the school from government.

With this in mind LMPS Governing Body has started looking at the
implications of this for LMPS as a school.

We are still very much in the early stages, but have started seeking engagement with possible local partners. It is important to ensure the overarching governing as well as day to day management structure is proficient, whilst also representative of all member schools, and discussions are scheduled into diaries to explore the way forward. For our children locally this should not lead to any significant changes. Our school will remain where it is and our familiar and valuable teaching staff will stay with us. The Governing Body will continue to ensure any decision made is the best one for the school and we will ensure to communicate with you all.

For now we must all continue to enjoy the busy term ahead, sooner than we would like there will be the annual nativity play and Christmas fayre to enjoy - I know, I have used the C-word and we are only in September!

## Read Write Inc

Firstly, thank you so much to those of you who were able to make the Read Write Inc (RWI) information meetings. It was fantastic to see so much support for reading at our school. Thank you also to the parents who have kindly given up their time to help with administrative jobs.

The children have already begun learning with our new RWI reading programme, in Reception, Year 1 and in targeted groups further up the school. We really want to get our children in Reception and Key Stage 1 off to a flying start with their reading and so far, we think you'll agree, it is proving very successful and popular with the children! We are really excited to start sending home reading books linked to the sounds the children have been learning, which we anticipate coming home at the start of October.

We strongly believe that reading is one of the most important skills that children can master at primary school. We want our children to read early and quickly so that they can not only enjoy reading, but use reading to learn.

Using RWI, the children learn to read effortlessly so that they can put all their energy into comprehending what they read. It also allows them to spell effortlessly so that they can put all their energy into composing what they write.

When using RWI to read the children will:

- learn 44 sounds and the corresponding letter/letter groups using simple picture prompts
- learn to read words using Fred Talk
- read lively stories featuring words they have learned to sound out
- show that they comprehend the stories by answering questions.

When using RWI to write the children will:

- learn to write the letters/letter groups which represent

## A new school year and a new beginning.

During the first few days at school, the children in each class have the opportunity to create their own class charter. Once developed the charter becomes a point of reference for the class and once signed by both teacher and children it signifies a shared activity and acts as the 'social glue' which binds everyone together.
