Dear Parents/Guardians,

The responsibilities of a school's governing body are plentiful, and a recent email I received from Dorset County Council reminded me of just this. Dorset County Council have recently appointed a new safeguarding standards advisor, and they wanted to contact us all to introduce themselves as well as remind us all of the role they fulfil.

Safeguarding is an important issue in any educational setting and at LMPS the governing body is part of ensuring the school has the appropriate policies and procedures in place as well as ensuring they are compliant with the latest legislation. The guidance we currently work to is called 'Keeping Children Safe in Education' from September 2016. Once one starts to look at areas covered by safeguarding it becomes quite a mine field, as it is not just their time at school that need careful consideration. Time outside of school both in the home as well as leisure activities are places where children should be able to feel safe and areas where they can be vulnerable. We also live in an age where young people even of primary school age spend more and more of their time in cyber space. It is good to know they are competent with computers and the use of online resources.

to help them with educational matters as well as leisure pursuits, but we must not forget the importance of educating the younger generation regarding pitfalls and dangers in the virtual reality world. LMPS have always had a strong record in offering awareness sessions to both parents and pupils alike on this front. Safeguarding is too large a subject to cover every element of it in a small write up. Looking at it from a slightly different angle, and hopefully an angle easier for us to influence I was recently reminded of Claudia Winkleman and her brave daughter Mathilda. In 2014 Mathilda's Halloween costume caught fire while they were out on what was meant to be a fun family evening of trick or treat. But as Claudia has told the media. the evening took a sudden turn when her daughter's skirt touched an open flame and caught fire. Due to the highly flammable material in the costume it proved very difficult to put the flames out, and Mathilda suffered severe burns to her legs, as did one of the adults trying to help her. Since coming to terms with the accident, Claudia Winkleman has been proactive in recommending parents carefully

check their children's outfits. she even appeared on BBC Watchdog to discuss the matter. With Halloween and bonfire night having just happened, maybe we can do our bit to safeguard all the children out for a family fun evening by ensuring any candles are well covered and that children are kept at a safe distance from them. Likewise, with bonfire night, respect for the bonfire itself as well as fireworks and sparklers alike are important messages to send to our children. Our own little role in the big world of safeguarding.



### Free School Meals


To make an application for Free School Meals (FSM), please ring 01305 251000.

## £100 Allowance

Any child that is entitled to free school meals via pupil premium, (i.e. in receipt of free meals because you are in receipt of benefits), can now claim £100 per school year to use towards costs related to their child's education. This funding can be used for items such as school uniform and educational school trips/experiences like swimming for example.
