## Year 4 Musicianship Programme

It is hard to believe that we are at the end of the Spring term - time flies when you are having fun and that is what we have been having in the studio this term!

Year 4 performed in a concert last week, showcasing the fantastic skills they have learned through the 10 week Musicianship Programme they took part in. Under the expert guidance of John Randall, Head of Brass at Dorset Music Service, they played their trumpets, cornets and trombones, performing a fanfare, a pop medley and a performance of "Human" by Rag n Bone Man. The improvement in their playing since week one is incredible and it was a joy to see how engaged and enthused they all were. We have a large group of children who will continue to learn to play their brass instruments next term, which is fantastic! They have had to consider musical elements such as pitch, dynamics and tempo and have created some wonderful pieces.

Rehearsals are well underway for this year's production, "Wildwood" with orchestra and choir getting to grips with some of the toetapping tunes you'll be hearing. It promises to be another superb show!

Links with the care home are growing ever stronger and this is the fourth visit we have made. After the performance the children mingled with the residents and enjoyed getting to know them. Road safety has a long history of being a challenge at LMPS due to its location on Wareham Road, the main thoroughfare in Lytchett Matravers. As a school we regularly remind staff, parents and pupils alike of the importance of safe behaviour on the road and pavements as well as within school grounds. It continues to be a challenge, and we need your help.

Since the loss of our school crossing patrol the roads have become even more of a challenge for our pupils walking to school, as there is no longer a safe crossing point for them to use.

It is exciting to see the work being done by the Parish Council and Sustrans, looking for improvements to traffic past school. The

afternoon closure of Wareham Road has stimulated thought and conversation around benefits as well as challenges around the options available for change. Collaboration has been at the heart of the project, allowing parents, residents and pupils all to have a voice in the discussions.

Following on from the afternoon road closure, LMPS spent a week enforcing the parking regulations at school. The school gates were closed, reserving the car park for staff and disabled badge holders as is its purpose. As a result, all pupils walking to school had to make use of the paths and pavements at school, preventing them from being at risk by walking through the car park entrance - an area designated for cars. While the initiative overall made the school grounds a safer place for pedestrians, it also highlighted the significance of the issues faced by drivers along Wareham Road. The road is simply not designed to cope with a high number of parked cars as well as moving vehicles, demonstrated particularly well on the day the bin lorries were out. Furthermore, it was deeply worrying to realise children form our school had to walk into the middle of a busy road to board their school transport, this due to parked cars blocking their designated collection area outside the gate by the school hall.

When all is said and done, I am sure we all agree what is most important is to ensure our children are safe on their journeys in and out of school. A challenge to us all is


to consider alternative, and safe, parking such as by the recreation ground - a mere 5-minute walk away from school. I would also like to remind pedestrians to remain on the paths and pavements designated for your use. There still remains a high number of parents as well as pupils who walk through the car park areas at school, and though the number of moving vehicles within school at pick up and drop off should be small they are still about. With our school transport in mind I cannot find any acceptable reason for making young children walk onto a busy road to get to the transport taking them home. Please bear this question in mind when pulling up to park outside the school gates 'would I like to put my own child at risk like that?'.

Finally, may I say thank you to all parents, pupils and staff for your patience and understanding during the week the gate was closed. Thank you also to all those who spent time talking to us by the gate, all your comments have been noted. I take great comfort from knowing the vast majority of you fully support the gates being closed, and the Governing Body continues to look for sustainable, safer options within school. Watch out for the next gate closure, hopefully coming to LMPS soon.

## A Wicked Afternoon

## Life Education Van 2019

Harold and the Life Education Van came to visit Lytchett Matravers Primary School. The Life Education Van is a charity that provides health, well-being and drug education to children aged 3-13 years. Their aim is to help equip young people with the knowledge, skills and selfconfidence to form positive healthy attitudes and make healthy choices.

All the children participated in a fun and interactive lesson, which is part of a series of age appropriate lessons, to understand the wonders of the human body and how to look after it. All the children love going into the mobile classroom, learning and having fun at the same time. In Reception, Year 1 and 2 they learnt about keeping their bodies healthy, feelings, being a good friend and the safe use of medicines. Then the older children in Key Stage 2 (Year3 -6) think and discussed the effects and risks associated with the use of drugs, including medicines, alcohol and tobacco. They also learnt about choices that can affect health and well-being, skills of friendships and how to cope with bullying and peer pressure.

## Screen Time



We all lead busy lives and sometimes it can be hard to manage the amount of time our children spend on electronic devices.

Whilst there are many advantages of the modern world we live in, it can be very easy to forget the simple pleasures in life like taking a walk, family dinners, board games, getting muddy in the garden, bike rides or scootering to the park.

Too much screen time can have a negative impact on the mental health and wellbeing of our children, sometimes resulting in children becoming:

- Overweight
- Sleep-deprived
- Less school-ready
- Inattentive, aggressive and less able to self-soothe

Here are 10 tips to help you and your child with healthy screen time:

1. Model Healthy Electronic Use It's important to role model healthy

electronics use for your children by setting a good example. Keeping the TV on for background noise all the time or scrolling through your phone any time you have a spare minute teaches your child bad habits. Remember conversation including eye contact is important.
2. Educate Yourself on Electronics Today's kids are tech-savvy. Most of them know more about electronics than adults do. That's why it's essential to stay up-to-date on the latest cell phone app or the newest social media craze.
3. Create "Technology-Free Zones" Establish zones in your house where you just don't allow electronics, like smartphones and laptops. For example, the dining room can be a great technology-free zone that is reserved for meals and family conversation.
4. Set Aside Times to Unplug Set aside times for the entire family to become unplugged from technological devices. For example, the dinner hour or an hour before bedtime can be great times for the entire family to have quality time together without TV, video games and computers

## 5. Use Parental Controls

Protect kids from explicit content on TV and online. Use parental controls that allow you to monitor what your children are viewing on TV and what they're doing online.
6. Talk to Kids about the Dangers of Too Much Screen Time
Kids who understand, "It's not healthy to watch too much TV," are less likely to try and break the rules compared to kids who think, "I can't watch TV because my parents are mean."
7. Obtain Your Child's Passwords Depending on your child's age and your values, it may make sense to obtain your child's passwords to any social media accounts or online accounts. It can also be important to establish rules about social media and what services you'll allow your child to participate in.
8. Encourage Other Activities

Kids easily grow dependent on technology for entertainment. Encourage your children to become involved in activities that don't involve screens. Get your child to play outside, read a book or play a game.
9. Make Screen Time a Privilege

Screen time should be a privilege and not a right. Take away privileges, such as TV time or computer use, as a negative consequence. Once you've set a limit on how much screen time is allowed, don't allow kids to earn extra time as a reward. Instead, stick to the daily limit and offer other free or low-cost rewards.

## 10. Don't Allow Screen Media in Your Child's Bedroom

It's impossible to monitor a child's screen media use if it's allowed in the bedroom. Don't allow your child to have a TV, video game system or computer in his room. This includes hand-held devices that many children use late at night, which can interfere with their sleep.

There are many other mental health issues linked with social media. Too much pressure can be put on children to look the 'right' way, wear the 'right' clothes and be seen doing the 'right' thing. Many social media apps have an age limit for a reason as Primary age children are not yet mature enough with such pressures. Please help your child have the carefree happy childhood they deserve.

## Y6 Celebrates National Shakespeare

## Week - 18th-22nd March 2019



The week started with Year 6 researching and reporting on why Shakespeare is considered to be one of the best writers - ever.

We learned many of the phrases in use today came from the Bard - including green-eyed monster, wild goose chase, off with his head and forever
and a day. He even invented Knock Knock jokes! He wrote numerous plays and poems but perhaps the main reason he is still widely regarded as one of the greatest writers is because he told good stories. We looked at one of those stories - MacBeth - throughout the week. MacBeth is a thriller and we loved learning about the power-driven couple who will do anything to stay on the throne of Scotland. With witches, murder and mayhem, the play proved that Shakespeare is not dull and boring!

Each class acted out an abridged version of the play, watched some film clips (including a spectacular rap) and wrote a character sketch based on MacBeth or his wife, Lady MacBeth.

On Friday, we finished the week by visiting the library for a Shakespeare
workshop. The library was decked out in our posters that we had made about Shakespeare and Mrs Thomas gave us a quiz to complete. We also learned about how to insult and compliment using Shakespearean language. If we said, 'Thou delicate thunder-darting Welsh cheese' are we being kind? What if we said, 'Thou gorbellied hedge-born dewberry' - are we making fun? Finally, we watched the community theatre group perform an act from MacBeth for us.

## World Book Day

Four weeks ago, Time Table Rock Stars (TT Rock Stars) landed in Lytchett Matravers Primary school. TT Rock Stars is an online game which encourages daily times tables practice.

The gaming format has been very successful and improvements in times tables recall speed are already being seem. The children in Years $3-6$ have answered over 600,000 questions correctly - that's an average of 2358 correct answers per child!

Acting maths lead, Mr Long commented: "TT Rock Stars allows us to set a carefully sequenced programme of times tables practice. Each week concentrates on a different times table. When children play in the

Garage or Arena sections of the game they only receive questions related to the times tables their teacher sets."

The game also allows children to set a rock speed, which is the average time taken to answer a question. AK commented: "I love trying to set a faster rock speed time. My current time is 1.2 seconds per question which means I'm a Rock Legend."
$\Pi$ Rock Stars also allows the children to build their own online avatar by spending coins they earn whilst playing. MA commented: "I enjoy changing my avatar's eyes, clothes and musical instruments." Due to the launch success, TT Rock Stars will start playing in Year 1 and 2 in the summer term.
